3. CONTENT

This course looks at English as an international language and as a lingua franca. It introduces students to the notion of "englishes" and the varieties of English used around the world (morphosyntactic and phonoligical-phonetic variations). The course also goes into different aspects of pragmatics and sociolinguistics.

- Week 3: Survey of Canadian English
- Week 4: Survey of Irish English
- Week 5: Survey of South African English
- Week 6: Survey of Australian and New Zealand English
- Week 7: Survey of the English language spoken in the former colonies (e.g. India, the Caribbean)

Week 8: "Uptalk", "Vocal Fry" and "Slang"

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Week 9: Political correctness in English, Linguistic Relativism

Week 10: The use of the English language in media

Week 11: Presentation of group assignments

Week 12: Presentation of group assignments

Week 13: Review of course material, feedback on group assignments
